Front Plaza Project

The project has been delayed due to a design issue. The plan to run the utilities for the fountain through the staff breakroom to the boiler room did not take into account the electrical conduits running along the hallway. After reviewing four possible options, we agreed to use the janitor's closet in the hallway next to the breakroom for the fountain's utilities. We are now waiting for the final plans to be submitted.

Children's Room Renovation

The Children's Room renovation project will begin on Monday, October 30 and should be finished the week before Thanksgiving (on or about November 18). We are working on the logistics for encouraging patrons to check out as many of the books as possible for the duration of the project, which will reduce the number of books we need to set up in the Main Reading Room.

Martland Donation

Dr. Theodore H. Martland has announced his intention to establish a fund in memory of his wife, Ingrid J. Martland, at the Connecticut Community Foundation. The fund will disburse approximately \$3,000 to the Silas Bronson Library each year, to be used for the purchase of books for children in first grade and younger.

The first disbursement of funds is anticipated for this fiscal year. Ingrid Martland taught at Mitchell Elementary School in Woodbury for 22 years and left a bequest for the Woodbury Public Library to donate one book per year to every kindergarten student in Region 14. Theodore Martland is the artist who created the colorful mobile which hangs in our front lobby, and he is the owner of The Elton Residential Care Home in Waterbury.

State Budget Cuts

The deliverIT program continues to pick up only 3 bins per day. Our current backlog is about four weeks' worth of deliveries. I have instructed our staff to scale back on filling open requests for ILLs – these requests normally are highly desirable, as our ConnectiCard/borrowIT payments are based on how many orders we fill. However, we received only \$964 from this program last year, and we are overwhelmed by the backlog of books.

The State Budget is still undecided. Both the Democrat and Republican proposed budgets protected funding for public libraries, whereas the Governor's proposed budget eliminated funding (which would have left us with a nearly \$64,000 loss in next year's budget). What happens next is anyone's guess. If the City of Waterbury sees a reduction in state funds for general operating support, we may see budget reductions for the library for this fiscal year.

Special Programs

We have a number of big programs scheduled for next month. I hope that the Board of Agents will be able to attend the programs.

Waterbury native Nancy Palmento Schuler will present her one-woman play, *Three Women, Three Roads*, inspired by actual Waterbury area women, on Saturday, October 7, at 2 p.m. This is our second Benevento Fund program.

The 10th Annual Pavarotti Concert is Saturday, October 14, at 4 p.m. We have received a grant of \$1,000 from the Arts & Tourism Commission to help support this program. The concert is the same day as the United Way Bed Race on Grand Street; our tenor, Chris Macchio, will perform a preview during the bed race prior to the concert.

The Waterbury Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony will be held at the Mattatuck Museum on Saturday, October 21, at 2 p.m. at the Mattatuck Museum. This year's inductees are Judge Robert D. Glass, Philip V. Benevento, and Ryan Gomes.

The 13th annual Mardi Gross and 2nd annual Halloween ComicFest will be held on Saturday, October 28, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Volunteers are needed to assist with this. Donations of candy are needed as well.

Last but not least, we are collaborating with UConn-Waterbury's Urban & Community Studies Program and Connecticut Humanities for a two-part community conversation funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities. The first part, on Thursday, October 26, starting at 5:30, will discuss the history of downtown Waterbury. The second part, on Thursday, November 2, also at 5:30, will be an open dialogue about the potential future of downtown. Both sessions will be moderated by Larry Rifkin.

Bunker Hill Branch

Following the retirement of Hugh Curran, I have asked Margaret Keating, who is a Librarian III, to take the lead on the oversight of the branch library. Margaret is working with some of our other librarians to do an assessment of branch operations and is making recommendations for improvements.

Employee Updates
