The exhibit embraces

the teachings of tolerance, diversity, unity and educating people that there was a time when imagery played a significant role in how African Americans were perceived.



Fletcher, an African American, is a 21-year veteran of the New Haven Police Department. He began collecting and exhibiting these artifacts to educate people about the history of racism in the United States.

WATERBURY PIONEERS: CHESHIRE COUNTRY CLUB

Library Director and local historian Raechel Guest will present the history of the Cheshire Country Club, founded by a group of Waterbury residents in 1917 as the first country club in the United States to be owned and operated by and for African Americans.

Wate-bury.—Said to be the first of its kind in the country is the Country club on the Cheshire road near the rail-toad bridge at West Cheshire. Never before, it is claimed, have any colored people in the country gotten together and organized a club for the best people of their race, according to Johnson L. Hails of this city, founder of the new club. Mr. Hails, who is chef for Mrs. Harriet B. Thorpe, has seen the need of a place of recreation for people of his race who are in a position to appreciate it and already he says colored people from all parts of the country have signified their intention of joining the club.



THE LIFE OF ASA PHILIP RANDOLPH



which led to banning discrimination in World War II defense industries – and later ending segregation in the armed services.

Anytime! There is no deadline; we will keep sharing your stories for as long as you keep sharing them with us.


What Happens to My Story?

YOUR STORIES SHARED



My first visit to the Silas Bronson Library was at its Brooklyn branch in 1948. Holding my mother's hand, we strolled down from

our rent on Washington Avenue and walked inside the little brick building with the jazzy Romanesque facade that echoed that of its neighbor, Duggan School.

The Children's Room was on the second floor, up one flight of wooden steps that led, in my opinion, to paradise. So many books! Books in bins and on shelves that lined all sides of the little room that overlooked Bank Street from a tall, wide window in its front wall.

And there, in plain sight on a low child sized table in a shaft of sunlight, was my first library book, Millions of Cats, by Wanda Gag. "Hundreds of cats, thousands of cats, millions and billions and trillions of cats..." repeated the text as the old man searched far and wide for a pet for his wife. My mother did not like cats, so I had to make do with the gray tabby belonging to Grandma's landlady on Riverside Street. But this small book with its yellow, black and orange cover thrilled me with possibilities.

When my little sister was around the same age as I was at my first library visit, I took her to the main branch of the Silas Bronson Library on Grand Street, and Millions of Cats was one of the first books I borrowed to read to her.

Wikipedia notes that this book is said to be the oldest American picture book still in print. Good things last, just like our City's library, a gift from Silas Bronson, and like my memories too, of the book that began for me a lifetime love of reading.




