# RENOVATIONS

Work on the front plaza continues into the fall. Just as that project finishes, we'll be launching a renovation of the Children's Room, installing new shelving and carpeting. There will be some disruption of service during the renovation: the Children's Room will be closed and most of the books will

# DELIVERIT CT SERVICE

Due to state budget cuts, the delivery of books and other items between libraries through the DeliverIT CT program has been significantly reduced since July. We typically generate as many as 10 bins per day, but the new changes mean that only 3 bins per day are being picked up. The backlog of items waiting to go out is piling up steadily.

What does this mean for you? Books from other libraries which are returned here will not be available for other borrowers for at least a month, if not longer. If a book from here is requested through another library in Connecticut, that book will not be picked up for delivery for at least a month, if not longer.

What can you do to help? If you are able to return items in person to the library you borrowed them from, instead of returning them here, that will help reduce the number of items we have waiting to send out.







## TRIBUTE TO LUCIANO PAVAROTTI

## WHO SHOULD BE HERE?

"Be Here" is a tag line for a recent initiative by the City of Waterbury and the Waterbury Chamber of Commerce to entice new businesses and people to move to Waterbury. The City has just completed a \$2.2 million renovation of the Green in downtown Waterbury, part of a larger effort to revitalize the downtown and entice new groups of people to the city center.

But who exactly does the city envision being here? National chain stores? College students? What about current downtown residents, bus riders, and business owners? The question is a complex one causing the community to ask itself, "Who should be here?"



# WHO WAS HERE?

Thursday, October 26, 5:30-7:45 p.m. Main Reading Room

Longtime CPTV producer and radio host Larry Rifkin will moderate a panel of local scholars and historians who will look at the history of life in downtown Waterbury and address the question of "Who Was Here?" The session will examine immigration patterns, the various ethnic groups who have called downtown Waterbury home, and the changes to the area as the city's industrial base moved away. Refreshments will be served. The Silas Bronson Library, the University of Connecticut Urban and Community Studies Program, and Connecticut Humanities will explore the topic through a two-part discussion that looks at issues related to urban development, immigration, and ethnicity and whose voices have, or have not, been heard in planning Downtown Waterbury's future.

The program is part of a six-month exploration of the legacy of race and ethnicity in our state by Connecticut Humanities, with the support of a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. Waterbury is one of five cities selected for this project, along with West Hartford, New Haven, Stamford, and Groton.



### HERE AND NOW

Larry Rifkin returns to moderate a public discussion about "Here and Now" that will talk about where the city is today—and where it might go tomorrow. City stakeholders from residents, to public officials, to local merchants, to developers are invited to come and participate in an open dialogue together that allows everyone's voices to be heard, questions to be asked, and visions discussed. The session will be videotaped and transcribed to assist all in moving the discussion forward. Refreshments will be served.




